Business Women's Collective (CME) Activities Developed 2021 to 2023

The project began its activities in July 2021 in Jardim Barro Branco – Duque de Caxias neighborhood in partnership with AECS (Association of Community Health Educators).

Since then, it is possible to see how much this work makes a difference in the lives of the residents of the neighborhood. In two and a half years, the project has offered a variety of courses: Baking (pastries, party

candies, snacks), Basic Electrician, Health Educator Agents, Dance (Ballet); and activities with Reading, storytelling in the Library, distribution of basic food baskets with healthy fruits and vegetables, oral health action, and fundraising skills (raffles, bingo, feijoadas, bazaar). We are fully aware that we cannot stand idly by in the face of social injustices.

Dear Faithful Partners,

We recognize that it has been a year since the last newsletter, and we apologize but you will soon understand. After the death of my beloved husband and mission partner in September of 2019, though grieving left me lost, I had promised Gus I would take his ashes back to his home state of Minais Gerais, Brasil and prepared to do so but our beloved dog Pretinha was also mourning and I could not leave her. A year later at the age of 20 our beloved Pretinha left to join Gus, and I prepared to leave and then came the pandemic, and so it wasn't until December 31st of 2021 at age 90, that I was able to return to Brasil.

I was shocked at the enormous growth of the population and many changes but all that I wrote about in the last newsletter. After 3 months, I knew that this was the place I wanted to be at this time in my life for there was still much to do to try to make sure our NGO could become financially independent, so I came back to the States and with the approval of the First Congregational Church of River Falls, WI, Rev Chris Myers and Rev Franz Rigert, NW Wisconsin Association, I became a volunteer Health Education Missionary and could then get my Permanent Residency renewed.

I moved into the low income homes that were built after the floods of 1996 where so much of the Favela (shanty town) where Gus and I worked had been destroyed. I began a health class with one of my ex students now a nurse and participated in the life and projects of our NGO as you read of in the last Newsletter. I also participated in some of the programs of the Clinic which has my name. But I soon realized what an important place our NGO had in the life of this community AND at that moment I was age 91--what would happen to the donations so necessary for this NGO to continue its work, when I pass on???

The NGO had to find a way to become financially independent of the donations from the churches in the USA which had made the NGO's work possible. So Isabel and I wrote a newsletter of all our activities and health work we had accomplished and asked for donations. We sent our funding request to other Brasilian organizations and the many well-to-do students of English I had over the years. We added pictures and testimonies and proudly sent it off! But all that we received were donations from 2 families with whom I was, and still am, very close. They are monthly but we don't know for how long.

So what to do? Then I remembered my friend Rubem Cesar who worked with me in ISER (Institute for The Study Of Religion), when I too was a participant. He founded an Organization called Viva Rio, "Long Live Rio", involved in social work for the benefit of the working classes. This Organization has been very successful in getting funds. So whoopee, I thought, here's our chance to get some money! But it turned out to be far better than that! They proposed using our building to open a popular priced medical specialities clinic with Cardiology, dermatology etc. These reatments in the inadequate public health system are extremely confusing and difficult. Thus these popular clinics at low prices are becoming very important! They would use our building and pay the upkeep of the building in exchange for the money earned from the popular clinic consultations. They would pay a minimal amount of rent for the building, and as they earned more money, we would also. But their main interest was their connection to the city health system from whom they would receive their money. We could keep our programs in special places in our large building, BUT their interest, we soon learned, was to take advantage of our well known and excellent physical therapy program--the only one in this large area of the city!!! This plan sounded good and offered a chance at financial independence or at least enough for our current projects and hopefully some new ones too. This was 6 months ago; there have been all sorts of problems and no equality in the decision for our NGO. They have stalled our physical therapy program at only one therapist with a waiting list of 91 patients! I walk the streets of the shanty town and listen to the older folk who so need this PT program who are on this waiting list and not familiar with modern technology for contact. But we only have the one physical therapist until Viva Rio can hire more. At the moment AECS, with the population, are waiting on the bureaucracy so typical of Brasil, plus our income is very low because of the building of a Community Center in the poor rural area of Caxias. We are struggling for we used many more funds than ever before for the building of this Community Center, and because of the extreme violence in our community and surrounding areas due to a war which came upon us a year ago. This war is among illegal groups trying to take over large areas in this part of Rio - groups that are violent and cruel, wanting at all costs to control the area, threatening lives if the protection money they demand is not given, and now you can understand why our daily lives have changed! Our evening and night time programs are on hold, as well as our Matriarch's day group, for fear of stray bullets, etc.

We now have a police station beside our NGO building and the population knows we will not give up, even though for safety as well as financial reasons, we are limited. People, especially older people (my specialty), look to our NGO for help. I am here until we can find a way for our NGO to be financially secure! We are working hard to evaluate and improve our Board of Director's participation, and that is vitally important. We are so grateful for your financial support for without this we would not have been able to be the organization that this community is so proud of! As I walk the streets and alleys, though I hear complaints, I also hear gratitude and pride. We are in need of help as never before to preserve 28 years of our NGO which you have made possible!

PROJECT PROPOSALS FOR 2024

Faced with the situation of violence experienced by children, adolescents and young people in low-income communities, we believe that developing activities focused on ARTS (dance, music, theater) and EDUCATION (courses, encouragement of reading and university preparations) are fundamental to remove the image that living in the midst of VIOLENCE is normal! Through the projects we have developed over the years, we seek to show that there are paths and opportunities that can change and transform lives. We present as proposals for 2024 the following Projects:

1. PLAYROOM

Work that uses toys and pedagogical materials that help the professional to develop activities in a PLAYFUL way, making it easier for the child to learn, understanding the information that is being transmitted. The idea is to work with themes that can contribute to the construction of a sense of responsibility in the various environments in which the child lives, making him feel that he belongs to that space, family, community, among others. Suitable for audiences between 5 and 10 years old.

2. MUSIC IS A HAPPY PROJECT

Currently we work in the music workshop only with the guitar. This project, for the most part for children and adolescents with ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and Disorder; Autism, Microcephaly, others.) The proposal is to expand this work, adding wind instruments (flute) as well as percussion instruments (tambourine, maracas). Another proposal for the work is the formation of a musical instrument group suitable for audiences between 7 and 18 years old.

3. DRUGS DO NOT MAKE LIFE HAPPY

An important work that aims to prevent, inform and guide adolescents, young people and adults about the risks that drugs pose to the health and life of those who use them. The approach to this issue is essential to make everyone aware, especially those responsible for the risks that legal and illegal drugs pose. This project will be developed by trained people and professionals, given the complexity of the topics that will be developed. Suitable for teenagers, young people, and adults and their families.
